



The Town of Harrisburg adopted a Fats, Oil and Grease (FOG) ordinance in April of 2006. This ordinance was put in force to help prevent sanitary sewer blockages and obstructions. This ordinance is also posted on the Town’s website under the Public Works department.

The main source of the grease problem is from cooking establishments, but households may also contribute this problem. The cooking establishments are required to have grease traps and grease collection containers. These grease traps and containers should be regularly cleaned and pumped to prevent the grease from entering the sanitary sewer system.

Households should not pour grease or oil down drains or garbage disposals. Grease should be collected in old coffee can or jar and allowed to cool before throwing in the trash. Remember grease blockages can cause wastewater to back up inside homes and damage property.

FY2020 Annual Report

Description

The Sanitary Sewer Collection System for the Town of Harrisburg is comprised of approximately 133 miles of gravity sanitary sewer lines, 4 miles of force mains and 17 wastewater pump stations. The purpose of the system is to collect and transport wastewater generated by the Town’s 8351 customers to the Rocky River Treatment Plant.

The Rocky River Treatment Plant is owned and operated by the Water and Sewer Authority of Cabarrus County.

Performance

The Town’s Public Works Department performs the operation and maintenance of the collection system. Our system serves approximately 17000 residents through the 8351 connections on the collection system. There are 3 crews responsible for maintaining our system. One crew is dedicated to the upkeep and maintenance of the Town’s 17 wastewater pump stations. This crew visits the stations daily and maintains the stations through cleaning and sludge removal. One crew is responsible for line cleaning and videoing sewer lines to make sure we stay in compliance with the state of North Carolina regulations. This crew has cleaned 13.3 miles and videoed 9.3 miles of gravity sewer lines. The third crew is responsible for repairs, easement maintenance, critical area inspections and investigating sewer related problems. There were 38 sewer related problems in the past year.

There was one reportable spill of 13,350 gallons at the leatherwood pump station due to flooding.

The Town of Harrisburg continues to update the Collection System through Capital Improvement Projects.
